The NBC News | SurveyMonkey Alabama State Poll was conducted online from Sunday, September 9, through Monday, September 24, 2018. Results are among a sample of 1,403 adults aged 18 and over, including 1,254 registered voters, who live in Alabama. The error estimate for registered voters is plus or minus 3.8 percentage points.

METHODOLOGY

The NBC News|SurveyMonkey Alabama State Poll was conducted online among a sample of 1,403 adults aged 18 and over, including 1,254 who say they are registered to vote and live in Alabama from September 9 through September 24, 2018. Respondents for this survey were selected from the nearly three million people who take surveys on the SurveyMonkey platform each day.

A raking was employed to construct state-level weights. First, postal zip codes are classified into five groups according to their population sizes. Initial respondent weights are derived from estimated sampling rates on the SurveyMonkey News Tracking Endpage within each zip code group. The initial respondent weights are then raked by gender, age, race, and education within the state to match targets obtained from the American Community Survey.

Because the sample is based on those who initially self-selected for participation rather than a probability sample, no estimates of sampling error can be calculated. All surveys may be subject to multiple sources of error, including, but not limited to sampling error, coverage error, and measurement error.

To assess the variability in the estimates and account for design effects, we create a bootstrap confidence interval to produce an error estimate. The bootstrap confidence interval for registered voters in this survey is plus or minus 3.8 percentage points.

To calculate the bootstrap confidence interval, we use the weighted data to generate 10,000 independent samples and calculate the 95% confidence intervals for the weighted average. When analyzing the survey results and their accuracy, this error estimate should be taken into consideration in much the same way that analysis of probability polls takes into account the margin of sampling error.
